Coronavirus: why something needs to change. Now.

- Despite the incredible efforts of care home staff, social care was ignored during the first part of the crisis with devastating consequences. People with dementia have been worst hit by the pandemic, accounting for a quarter of all coronavirus deaths in the UK.
- For people who survived the crisis, the effects of social isolation were severe. 46 % of people with dementia in our survey reported that lockdown had a negative impact on their mental health - and symptoms deteriorated.
- The crisis hit family carers and professional carers hard. In the first lockdown 92million extra hours were spent caring for loved ones.
- Alzheimer's Society's Worst Hit Report paints a full picture of the impact coronavirus has had on the army of unpaid carers.




What is social care?

- In the UK, people can draw on our social care system for practical support they may need because of illness or disability. It helps many of us to stay independent, complete daily activities, and stay connected to our community.
- Many people affected by dementia access the social care system to help them manage the symptoms of dementia as it progresses. In the UK, over 60% of people who receive homecare, and 70% in care homes are people living with dementia.
- Social Care works differently in England, Wales and Northern Ireland. However, each national Government is responsible for the overall funding of the social care system, setting delivery standards and giving local government the tools and resources for effective implementation of services to meet people's needs.

The dementia care crisis.

- Many families experience stress and anguish fighting for the care they need. Even when care is accessed, there is no guarantee that it will be of good quality.
- With no cure for dementia, it's social care, not the NHS, that people affected by dementia rely on to support them as their condition progresses.
- People with dementia represent the majority of social care users, so it is vital that the care system is made fit for purpose.
- One in three of us born in the UK today will go on to develop dementia in our lifetime - there will be one million people living with dementia by 2025.




A dementia diagnosis claims more than one life

- Feelings of confusion, desperation and isolation don't just affect people with dementia, they're symptoms the people closest to them experience too.
- Until the care system is reformed, a dementia diagnosis will continue to claim more than one life, as the families facing dementia feel its destructive effects.
